# 2017 WAYNE COUNTY FAIR ASSOCIATION COMMITTEES

## SECTION 1 - GENERAL RULES

- 1. An Association receiving an allotment shall not limit the entries of the entire fair or show to members of an association or organization.
- 2. The Fair Board reserves the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and to arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard thereto. It further reserves the right to amend or add to these rules. The State of Michigan has eliminated all Premium Funding for Open Class and Youth Department exhibits for the 2017 Fair. As a result of the state cuts, the Fair Board reserves the right to make any changes in premiums paid in 2017 as they deem necessary.
- 3. Disregard of any rule by exhibitor or concessionaire forfeits all premiums, rights, and privileges without recourse.
- 4. The Wayne County Fair Association will use diligence to insure the safety of livestock and articles entered for exhibition or display after their arrival on the grounds, but under no circumstances will it be responsible for loss, injury or damage by fire, lightning, wind or by any other agency, to such livestock, article on exhibition or display, and the Fair and management thereof shall be held harmless by the exhibitors against all legal or other proceedings relating thereto.
- 5. Exhibitors must place all exhibits under the direction of the Wayne County Fair Association or Superintendent in charge.
- 6. All bedding for stalls and pens must be supplied by the exhibitor. Exhibitors will be permitted to bring onto the grounds only a limited amount of feed, hay or straw, and the Superintendents of the Wayne County Fair Association reserve the right to refuse admission of such if, in their judgment, there is an excessive amount. The space in the barns is for exhibition purposes and not for storage of feed or bedding.
- 7. No exhibitor or concessionaire will be permitted to sublet or share any portion of the space allotted them. A violation of this rule will result in the original purchaser of space forfeiting all their rights and removal of themselves, partners, employees, and wares from the grounds.
- 8. All exhibits to be hung must be mounted on stiff cardboard or framed and must have provision for hanging. Glued hangers, scotch tape, etc., are not suitable for hanging and their use is not acceptable. Improperly mounted exhibits will not be accepted.
- 9. ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES PERMITTED ONLY AT YOUR CAMPSITE. ANY ONE POSSESSING ALOCHOLIC BEVERAGES OUTSIDE OF THEIR CAMPSITE WILL BE IMMEDIATELY REMOVED FROM THE FAIRGROUNDS. ANY PERSON BEING INTOXICATED AND/OR CREATING A DISTURBANCE WILL ALSO BE REMOVED FROM THE FAIRGROUNDS.
- 10. Premium money may be collected at the Fair Office when announced. Winners, or immediate family, must show up in person to collect their premium money. All checks will be void 60 days after date of issue and will not be reissued. The Fair reserves the right to pro-rate premiums if funding is not received from the State of Michigan or if Fair receipts are insufficient to pay expenses.
- 11. The Fair cannot be held responsible for mistakes in the book, and we reserve the right to make corrections where and when mistakes appear.
- 12. THE WAYNE COUNTY FAIR ASSOCIATION BOARD WILL NOT BE RESPONSIBLE FOR LOSS OR DAMAGE TO EXHIBITS.
- 13. THE WCFA GROUNDS IS PRIVATE PROPERTY: ABSOLUTELY NO CONCEALED WEAPONS OR OPEN CARRY OF FIREARMS.
- 14. For the safety of everyone, the following are strictly prohibited during the week of the Fair: Bikes, skateboards, roller skates or roller blades.
- 15. Whenever a conflict arises between Fair Book Rules and 4-H Rules, Fair Book Rules will prevail.

## **SECTION 2 - ENTRIES**

- 1. Applications for entries in all departments must be made on the printed forms provided by the Fair Office, or online, for that purpose and must be in full compliance with the printed instructions on same. The WCFA reserves the right to reject any entry. Any entry deemed inappropriate by any Superintendent shall be brought before the Board of Directors and a decision as to appropriateness will be made prior to judging.
- 2. All entries must be made in the name of the exhibitor. In order that a permanent record be on file, it is essential that the name and ear tag numbers of all animals entered be given where appropriate. Entries will not be accepted unless this information is furnished at time of entry. Each exhibitor will be required to present appropriate identification, health report, scrapie proof of entry, if called upon to do so by the Superintendent in charge of each department. See specific division for details.

- 3. Incomplete entries will not be accepted: Exhibitors are urged to enter early and to use great care in filling out entry blanks.
- 4. Closing dates for entries and dates of entry and release in the various departments are listed under rules for the department.
- 5. All exhibitors are requested not to invite or permit judges to examine their animals in stall or pens before they enter the show ring.
- 6. Misrepresentations as to breeding or ownership of animals and irregularity or violation of rules in showing will be exposed. Any premium won by such exhibitor will be forfeited. If any premium has already been paid before the evidence is given that such violation has occurred, the exhibitor must refund premium money to the Fair Secretary or be barred from exhibiting at the Wayne County Fair.

## SECTION 3 - HANGING ART PROJECTS

- 1. All pieces must be framed and ready for hanging. If not framed, it must be matted. It is suggested that 14-ply matting be used for framing or foam core board. NO CONSTRUCTION PAPER FOR MATTING.
- 2. The hanging apparatus must be attached to the frame, 14-ply matting, or foam core board with wire. Please do not use any tape for hanging as it will not hold through the week of Fair.
- 3. If using the 14-ply matting, or foam core board, punch holes about 1-inch in from top and sides and string wire through.

## SECTION 4 - FEES

- 1. All applications for stalls and pens must be noted on entry at time of filing unless the division has made previous arrangements for assigning stalls and pens. Exhibitor must indicate on the entry the number of animals or birds shown. ALL CHECKS MUST BE MADE PAYABLE TO THE WAYNE COUNTY FAIR ASSOCIATION.
- 2. Fair Exhibitors are required to pay the entry fee listed in each Division entered.
- 3. The livestock entry deadline is JULY 1. ALL CLASS ENTRIES MUST BE POSTMARKED BY JULY 1 AND PAYMENT ENCLOSED OR A \$1.00 PER HEAD LATE FEE WILL BE CHARGED. No livestock entries will be accepted after July 15.
- 4. The equine entry deadline is JULY 1. ALL EQUINE ENTRIES MUST BE POSTMARKED BY JULY 1 AND STALL FEES PAYMENT ENCLOSED <u>OR</u> A \$20.00 PER EXHIBITOR LATE FEE WILL BE CHARGED. No equine entries will be accepted after July 15.
- 5. The Community Arts Adult and Youth entry deadline is July 1. ALL CLASS ENTRIES MUST BE POSTMARKED BY JULY 1 AND PAYMENT ENCLOSED OR A \$1.00 PER CLASS LATE FEE WILL BE CHARGED. No perishable entries will be accepted after the Saturday before Fair haul-in. No non-perishable entries will be accepted after the Saturday of Fair haul-in. See the Adult and Youth Community Arts Division Rules for the specific dates and times.

## SECTION 5 - JUDGES

- 1. Judges will be appointed by the Wayne County Fair Association.
- 2. Judges will in no case award a premium where there is no merit, even though there is no competition. Where there is partial merit an award may be made accordingly.
- 3. In no case will premiums be paid on exhibits which are not actually on display during the Fair.

## SECTION 6 - AWARDS

- 1. Premiums will be paid only on animals fitted for show purposes and no animal shall receive more than one prize in one class.
- 2. Checks for all premiums will be distributed as soon as possible.
- 3. Premium ribbons or cards have no value as to payment of premiums since premiums are paid only from the judge's record.
- 4. The Fair reserves the right to pro-rate premiums if funding is not received from the State of Michigan, or if Fair receipts are insufficient to pay expenses.

## SECTION 7 - PROTEST and APPEALS

- 1. Protests must be made in writing and filed with the Fair Secretary. In accordance with the annual appropriation act, exhibitors are allowed to file a written complaint within 10 days after the end of the fair or exposition, accompanied by protest fee of \$30.00, which will be retained by the Wayne County Fair Association.
- 2. All protests will be considered at a time set by the Wayne County Fair Association and all parties interested will be notified. The decision of the Wayne County Fair Association Board of Directors is final.

## SECTION 8 - RELEASE

- 1. Exhibits in all competitive divisions may be removed according to the rules of the Division.
- 2. No article or exhibit may be removed other than above specified, except by written permission of the Wayne County Fair Association.
- 3. The Wayne County Fair Association will not be responsible for any properties or exhibits not called for by the time stated in the rules for the Division.
- 4. Competitive exhibits which have not been claimed by the exhibitor by noon Sunday, August 14 unless other arrangements are made, will be considered to have been abandoned and will be disposed of as the Wayne County Fair Board may see fit.

## SECTION 9 - PETS

- 1. **NO** dogs are allowed on midway or in buildings. Any exhibitor/camper with aggressive, unattended or excessively barking dogs will be asked to remove the dog from the fairgrounds.
- 2. All dogs on the grounds must be kept on leashes. If this rule is not obeyed, the dog warden will be called and the dog will be removed from premises.
- 3. Carnival concessionaires must keep dogs in campgrounds at all times on leashes.
- 4. All dog owners will be responsible as prescribed by law.

## SECTION 10 - BICYCLES

1. During Fair, bicycles are not allowed to be ridden on the fairgrounds.

## SECTION 11 - CAMPING

- 1. All sites will be assigned by the Camping Superintendent. No specific site can be guaranteed.
- 2. A separate application must be submitted for each campsite and period of time desired. Full payment must accompany the application.
- 3. Mailed applications must be received 10 days prior to beginning of Fair.
- 4. Reservations may be made by mail or in person only if camper is an exhibitor's parent or guardian.
- 5. A campsite can be occupied by only one unit.
- 6. NO REFUNDS.
- 7. Camping permit and/or exhibitor pass are required for entry into Fairgrounds.
- 8. Exhibitor passes are available from Camping Superintendent.
- 9. Parents or guardians shall be responsible for their youth.
- 10. Failure to pay for camping will result in ineligibility to show in the following year.

# SECTION 12 - GENERAL RULES DAIRY, LIVESTOCK & HORSE DIVISION

- 1. Exhibitor will furnish feed, hay and straw as necessary to properly care for their animals, and the animals must be kept clean at all times or they will be removed from the grounds.
- 2. Exhibitors are to fit, show and take care of their own exhibits at the Fair. Clean up MUST follow the removal of exhibits after Fair or forfeit premiums.
- All Youth animal exhibits must have been registered on the proper Wayne County Entry/Premium form if required by that division.

- 4. All market animals must be identified by ear tag, tattoo markings or ear notches. The animal must be identified to a specific person or family (whose members are identified) at the time of tagging. Only that individual or an exhibitor from that family will be allowed to show from that group of tagged animals. Tagging/tattooing will be done by the Wayne County Fair Association Barn Superintendents and witnessed by the 4-H Auction Chairperson and an additional 4-H Auction Committee designee with the exception of Rabbits and Poultry.
- 5. Weigh-in of market animals shall be conducted by Barn Superintendent and witnessed by the 4-H Auction Chairperson and a designated Fair Board representative.
- 6. All state sanitary and health regulations must be met. All animals not conforming to this will be refused or released.
- 7. Any animal with a contagious disease shall be excused from the grounds. Approval to leave must be obtained from the appropriate superintendent.
- 8. Any animal sent home, officially designated as sick, shall not be required to forfeit premium.
- 9. UNAUTHORIZED PERSONNEL ARE NOT ALLOWED INSIDE OF SHOW RINGS.
- 10. All animals will be washed in designated areas outside of buildings only.
- 11. No coaching from outside of ring.
- 12. No animals allowed out of building after sundown or before sun up unless approved by barn superintendent.
- 13. All animals must be trained to stand in a stall or pen. Unmanageable animals will be sent home.
- 14. All livestock exhibits and areas occupied by them must be kept in good order by exhibitor as directed by the superintendent in charge. Exhibitor is responsible for their own cleanup equipment, such as rakes, shovels, etc.
- 15. All buildings where livestock are exhibited shall be totally cleaned by date and time given by Superintendents.
- 16. Any person or persons receiving any monetary benefits or fees shall come under the jurisdiction of the Fair Association.
- 17. Fair Association will furnish, at least, the same amount of cages, stalls, pens, counters, etc., as the previous year, if required.
- 18. Intrastate TB testing requirements for movement from one premise to another within Michigan are posted in the Animal Health Division.
- 19. The Wayne County Fair does not currently require drug testing to be performed on any livestock.
- 20. Exhibitor must be the owner of all market livestock.
  - 1. **BEST DECORATED BARN TROPHY** One trophy will be awarded in each of seven (7) Livestock barns to a group or individual, 2<sup>nd</sup> & 3<sup>rd</sup> place will receive rosettes.

# YOUTH DIVISION RULES & REQUIREMENTS

MANDATORY MEETING FOR ALL LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS AND LEADERS AT 6:00 P.M. SUNDAY EVENING IN THE LIVESTOCK PAVILION.

For exhibitors in the Youth Division. (General Rules will apply unless otherwise stated in Fair Book) **ELIGIBILITY:** 

- 1. An association receiving an allotment shall not limit the entries of the entire fair or show to members of an association or organization.
- 2. Youth members belonging to the 4-H Youth program under the supervision of Wayne County Michigan State University Extension are eligible to exhibit in any Youth Division along with other youth who meet the requirements of those classes.
- 3. In order to exhibit, an exhibitor must be between the ages of 5 to 19 years of age as of January 1st of the current fair year, except where specific age requirements are designated for a particular classification.

  (ex: Educational/Demonstration projects are open to youth 19 and under as of January 1st of current fair year.)
- 4. Future Fair exhibitors (4 and under) may enter projects for display in Division 72, Section 2. These projects will be reviewed by the judges and special participation ribbons will be awarded to all exhibitors. Each Future Fair exhibitor may display a maximum of five projects.
- 5. All exhibits will be judged according to Division guidelines.
- 6. No youth will be allowed to show any exhibit not entered under their name.
- 7. Whenever a conflict arises between Fair Book Rules and 4-H Rules, Fair Book Rules will prevail.

#### **PREMIUMS:**

- 1. The Board of Directors shall have the power to make prorated deductions from premiums offered if, in their opinion, the financial condition of the Association renders it necessary.
- 2. Premiums will be paid each exhibitor, according to the judge's placing, as indicated by the division and class entered.
- 3. NO PREMIUM SHALL BE AWARDED WHEN AN ANIMAL, BIRD OR ARTICLE IS DEEMED NOT WORTHY BY THE JUDGE. IN ADDITION, PREMIUMS WILL NOT BE AWARDED WHEN ANIMALS ARE NOT PROPERLY CARED FOR AS OUTLINED IN EACH ANIMAL DIVISION.
- 4. NO PREMIUM SHALL BE PAID ON EXHIBITS REMOVED FROM THE FAIRGROUNDS IN VIOLATION OF THE RULES OF THE ASSOCIATION.
- 5. Premium money and ribbons may be collected at the Fair Office when announced. Winners must show up in person to collect their premium money. All checks will be void 60 days after date. All uncashed checks will be considered a donation to the fairgrounds. The Fair reserves the right to pro-rate premiums if funding is not received from the State of Michigan or if Fair receipts are insufficient to pay expenses.

#### **CONDUCT:**

- 1. No unlicensed drivers shall operate any motor vehicle on the Fairgrounds during the Fair, except where vehicle operation is incorporated as a part of the Youth Program.
- 2. All those participating in the Fair will be expected to follow all rules and regulations set by the Wayne County Fair Association.
- 3. The decision of the judges shall be final. Any person or persons interfering or displaying unsportsmanlike conduct during the time of judging may be asked to leave the grounds.( NO ALCHOLIC BEVERAGES OR ILLEGAL SUBSTANCES WILL BE ALLOWED ON THE FAIRGROUNDS)
- 4. Exhibitor tags are required to pick up exhibits.
- 5. THE USE OF ILLEGAL SUBSTANCES (ALCOHOL OR ILLEGAL DRUGS) ON THE FAIRGROUNDS WILL NOT BE TOLERATED.
  ANY USE OF ILLEGAL SUBSTANCES BY YOUTH WILL RESULT IN IMMEDIATE REMOVAL FROM THE GROUNDS AND THE FOREITURE OF ALL MONIES.

YOUTH SHOULD READ DIVISION 39 RULES & REGULATIONS WHICH APPLIES TO ALL LIVESTOCK.

#### **EXHIBITOR DRESS CODE / SHOW ETIQUETTE**

Please remember you are representing the Wayne County Fair. In the show ring, you are showing your project that you have worked hard on. You do not want your attire to take away from your animal. In the auction ring, you are marketing your project animal and once again, you are representing Wayne County Fair and 4-H.

#### EXHIBITOR DRESS CODE FOR LIVESTOCK & SMALL ANIMAL SHOWS & AUCTION:

The following dress code is to be followed by all Wayne County Livestock exhibitors while in the show ring and auction. Deviations from the dress code will result in a request to change, or you may not show or sell your animal. This dress code is not subject to personal interpretation. A superintendent, assistant superintendent, extension agent, or show ring management may deem clothing inappropriate.

The following is considered appropriate dress:

- 1. Clothes must be clean and in good repair, free of holes, tears, and slashes.
- 2. Clothes must be free of vulgar, violent, alcohol-related, drug-related materials, or anything that alludes to it.
- 3. No shorts or cut-offs.
- 4. All items designated as underwear are kept under cover.
- 5. No halter tops or tops that expose undergarments or midriff.
- 6. Full-length shirt (chest and midriff covered).
- 7. No pants that expose undergarments.
- 8. No spaghetti straps.
- 9. No see-through garments, muscle shirts, or T-shirts.
- 10. No hats.
- 11. Closed toed shoes must be worn. Hard soled shoes must be worn in the large animal areas.
- 12. No cell phones in the show ring. Cell phone usage will result in the loss of placing ribbon and premium for that class. Any fair board member, superintendent or 4-H livestock committee member witnessing such behavior has the authority to remove an exhibitor from competition.

#### EXHIBITOR DRESS CODE DURING BARN DUTY

- 1. During barn duty, youth must dress in neat and clean clothes.
- 2. Closed toed shoes are mandatory.
- 3. All clothes must be free of holes, vulgar sayings, and alcohol-related or drug related materials.
- 4. All underwear should be covered.
- 5. No see-through clothes, tops with spaghetti straps, or muscle shirts are not to be worn.

Individual Barn Superintendents may have additional dress code requirements.

## DIVISION 2 YOUTH DAIRY

Superintendent: Jim Budd H (734-699-9022) C (734-740-8425)

Show Time: Wednesday - 5:00 p.m.

Stall Fee: \$10.00 per head

Dress Code: All exhibitors must wear white jeans, white shirt, and hard-soled shoes.

Age: Exhibitor must be 9 years old as of January 1<sup>st</sup> of the current year.

#### **Rules:**

- 1. See General Dairy, Livestock & Exhibitor Dress Code Rules.
- 2. See General Rules Dairy, Livestock and Horse Division, Rule #20 for Bovine Tuberculosis testing and movement requirements.
- 3. An exhibitor may not show more than one animal per class, except where progeny necessitates duplication.
- 4. Senior yearlings in production will show with the two year old class.
- 5. In addition to the conformation class, an exhibitor must enter and compete in the Showmanship class, or premiums will be forfeited for this division.

- 5. A person shall not bring swine into this state from auction sales or other collection facilities where slaughter swine are handled.
- 6. A person shall not import or release live feral swine or any crosses of feral swine in this state for any purpose without permission from the director, due to invasive species order in place by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources.
- 7. Pigs imported from out of state shall meet one of the following requirements:
  - a. <u>Originate directly</u> from a pseudorabies free state or region as designated by the United States Department of Agriculture or as determined by the director, OR
  - b. Originate directly from a qualified negative pseudorabies free herd or directly from a feeder pig monitored herd, OR
  - c. <u>Originate directly</u> from a state which participates in pseudorabies testing program that is approved by the director, OR
  - d. Individually test negative for pseudorabies within thirty (30) days prior to importation.
- 8. All market swine must be in possession and tagged according to livestock rules. All market hogs will be weighed and tagged on the **first Saturday of May.**
- 9. All swine information placing sheets will be turned into the barn superintendent by 4:00 p.m. on Sunday of ship in, or Swine Barn Superintendent will place swine in the classes as they see fit. All animals must be shown by the person who is identified on the sheet.
- 10. Swine due in stalls on Sunday, August 6, 2017 between 9:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m.
- 11. All market hogs must be weighed on arrival at Fairgrounds. Weigh-in of hogs will be limited to three per exhibitor.
- 12. Body clipping of hogs will be permitted so long as the hair is clipped no shorter than  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch.
- 13. All hogs washed on Sunday must be done by 10:00 p.m.
- 14. No swine will be allowed out of their pens after Sunday unless they are going to or from the show area. Only exhibitors and persons authorized by the Swine Barn Superintendent will be allowed in the show arena during the show
- 15. Each exhibitor must sign up for barn duty per the instructions on the sign-up sheet. Failure to complete your barn duty could result in lost premiums.
- 16. An exhibitor may not show more than one animal per class, except where progeny necessitates duplication. Premium paid only on one animal if duplicate entries in a class. Exhibitor is limited to only one (1) pen of two (2) hogs.
- 17. In addition to the conformation class, exhibitors must enter and compete in the Showmanship class.
- 18. Exhibitors must maintain clean animals and pens throughout the Fair or forfeit all premiums, ribbons, and trophies from this division. All animals must be fed and pans removed from the pens before 10:00 a.m. every morning and fed and pans removed from the pens before 6:00 p.m. every evening.
- 19. Market swine must meet the minimum weight of 180 lbs. in order to be exhibited at the Wayne County Fair. Maximum weight for swine is 300 lbs.

- 21. The Wayne County Fairgrounds no longer runs a terminal sale since pseudorabies are no longer found in this area of Michigan. Pseudorabies tests are not required as directed by the State Department of Agriculture. Due to unforeseen circumstances the Wayne County Fair reserves the right to declare a terminal sale in the best interests of the Fair.

- 22. All General Dairy, Livestock and Exhibitor Dress Code rules also apply. See that section in the Fair Book.
- 23. Failure to follow the above rules or other rules posted by the Barn Superintendent will result in forfeiture of premiums and awards in this division.

- 26. If you choose to wash your pigs the morning of the show, they must be returned to their pens no later than 7:00 a.m.

- 3. Premiums will be paid each exhibitor, according to the judges placing as indicated by the division and class entered. No exhibitor shall be paid more than one premium per class.
- 4. No premium shall be awarded when an animal is deemed not worthy by the judge, or animals not properly cared for. No premiums shall be paid on exhibits removed from the fairgrounds in violation of the rules of the association.
- 5. Breeding or Production Classes: Classes numbered one through six in each section will consist of one buck or one doe. Rabbits will be judged on breeding or production quality only as set up by ARBA standards. The classes are determined by age and sex.

MANDATORY MEETING FOR ALL HORSE EXHIBITORS AND LEADERS AT 7:00 P.M. SUNDAY EVENING BEHIND HORSE SHOW ENTRY BOOTH.

State law requires that an original negative Equine Infectious Anemia test must be presented to the Equine Committee before equine are unloaded onto the Fairgrounds. This original test must be available for the entire time the equine is present on the grounds.

#### Rules

- 1. ALL PREMIUM SHEETS MUST BE POSTMARKED BY JULY 1<sup>st.</sup> Premium Sheets will be accepted between July 1<sup>st</sup> and July 15<sup>th</sup> with a \$20 PER EXHIBITOR LATE FEE. NO PREMIUM SHEETS FOR EQUINE ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED AFTER JULY 15<sup>TH</sup>.

  No exceptions.
- 2. Stalls are required. Stall Registration Cards are due by <u>July 1<sup>st</sup></u> along with a \$30.00 Stall Fee. NO REFUNDS. No stall registrations will be accepted after July 15<sup>th</sup>.
  - **2a. NON-EXHIBITOR STALLS:** Stalls will NOT be available for persons other than registered exhibitors without permission obtained from WCFA **Equine Committee**. Requests for Non-Exhibitor stalls must be submitted for approval at a WCFA **Equine Committee** Meeting prior to July 15<sup>th</sup>.
- 3. A complete Fair Registration includes: Premium Form, Stall Registration Card, current year's negative Coggins, Emergency Participant Form and current fees.
- 4. All exhibitors shall be responsible for entering correct classes.
- 5. Entries will be closed without previous notice when all stalls are filled. Stall assignment priorities are as follows: Wayne County Youth, Out-County Youth, Wayne County Protégés, Adult/Open Exhibitors, Halter Only Horses, Non-Exhibitor Horses, Tack Stalls.
- 6. See General Rules and Regulations.
- 7. Premiums paid on classes where major emphasis is on exhibitor, not the animal.
- 8. Class judging will start at scheduled start time until end of scheduled classes.
- 9. NO COLTS OR STALLIONS ALLOWED.
- 10. Exhibitors must be at least nine (9) years through twenty (20) years.
- 11. Exhibitors' ages shall be determined as of January 1st of the current year.
- 12. Two exhibitors will be allowed to show the same animal at the Fair, as long as exhibitors are in different divisions.
  - 12A. If two exhibitors sharing a horse both qualify for the same Championship Class, said Championship Class shall be split to allow both riders to participate. The splits for this Championship Class shall be placed as one class.
- 13. Each exhibitor may register two horses, the second horse to be registered as a halter horse only.
- 14. All exhibitors are expected to conduct themselves with due consideration for others, respect for judges and show personnel, diligence in carrying out their respective responsibilities, and cooperation to make the Fair an attractive and informative event for all. ANY INSULTS OR DISRESPECTFUL ACTION BY AN EXHIBITOR SHALL BE BROUGHT TO THE EQUINE COMMITTEE FOR DISCIPLINARY ACTION. ALLEGED ACTIVITY MAY RESULT IN LOSS OF POINTS AND/OR REMOVAL FROM THE FAIRGROUNDS.
- 15. While in the ring, all Exhibitors shall practice proper ring manners.
- 16. When going to and from the show ring or practice area, the exhibitor **MUST WALK** their animal. Animals are not allowed in the campgrounds for **ANY REASON**.
- 17. No horses out of stalls after sundown or before sunup without the permission (in an emergency situation) from the Equine Superintendent or Barn Superintendent(s).
  - 17A. Once track events begin, horses are only allowed out of stalls IN THE BACK WORK ARENA. Horses must be LED to and from the back work arena and are ONLY permitted out during this time with CLOSE adult supervision. Horses MUST be returned to their stalls at dark. NO riding shall take place after dark.
- 18. Each exhibitor will be provided with one identifying Back Number to be worn visibly when in the show ring. Class numbers entered will be listed on the back of the number.
- 19. No bicycles, mopeds, or scooters of any kind allowed in Equine Exhibit area.
- 20. No blacksmithing will be done during the Fair, except in an emergency as approved by the Fair Board Equine Committee.

- 21. All animals exhibited are subject to veterinarian inspection.
- 22. Pony height will be 56" and under. Ponies will be measured at 6:00 p.m. Sunday evening on the horse wash rack. All ponies must be measured to receive an exhibitor number.
- 23. Early Release: A horse or equine exhibitor may be excused from the Fairgrounds due to sickness or injury. Special circumstance requests for early release must be made to the Fair Board Equine Committee prior to the commencement of the first class at Fair.
- 24. **NO ANIMAL SUBSTITUTIONS** may be made after <u>JULY 15<sup>th</sup></u>, unless approved by the Fair Board Equine Committee. Basis of approval for substitution are illness, injury to the animal, or special circumstances. Written verification from a veterinarian may be requested for approval by the Fair Board Equine Committee.
- 25. THE FAIRBOARD EQUINE COMMITTEE RESERVES THE RIGHT TO COMBINE OR SPLIT ANY AND ALL CLASSES IF DEEMED NECESSARY.
- 26. All exhibitors will be responsible for their own animals. The primary responsibility for the exhibitor and their safety rests with the exhibitor and with his/her parent or legal guardian.
- 27. Any equine exhibitor leaving the grounds for extended periods will notify their club Leader or their Equine Barn Superintendent and designate a responsible person during their absence.
- 28. Boots or shoes must be worn in any Costume Class.
- 29. DISCLAIMER: Protégé Program is sponsored by Wayne County 4-H Horse and Pony and is not sponsored by the Wayne County Fair.

#### **Barn Rules:**

- 1. ABSOLUTELY NO SMOKING IN ANY BARN.
- 2. No paper bedding.
- 3. No electric appliances (fans, etc.) in stalls.
- 4. No loose buckets in stalls.
- 5. Hay bags must be above ground level.
- 6. No mounting or riding in barns.
- 7. Walk horses to and from work and show ring.
- 8. Manure shall be put in designated areas only (not in trash cans).
- 9. Horse washing shall be in designated area only.
- 10. No painting on treated lumber.
- 11. No bare feet, no open-toed shoes allowed in stalls or immediate equine barn areas.
- 12. No stall decorations may be removed before 11:00 p.m. on Saturday night. No horses released before 8:00 a.m., on the last Sunday of Fair. Early removal will result in the loss of all premiums.
- 13. Stalls must be completely stripped and checked by your Barn Superintendent before leaving the Fairgrounds.
- 14. Absolutely no horses loose in the arena before/during/after Fair.
- 15. No dogs are allowed in Barn #1.
- 16. In an emergency, the Barn Superintendent or Fair Board Equine Committee will take appropriate action to safeguard the animals.
- 17. Practice limited to back Practice Arena unless otherwise notified. See Rule 16 under General Youth Horse and Pony Rules.

## **Competition Rules:**

- Rules for Equine Competition not addressed in the WCFA Fair Book shall follow the 4-H Horse & Pony Show Rules & Regulations. Copies of same may be obtained through the MSU Extension Office or the WCFA website.
- 2. Classes will run until finished. Class start times will vary **each day** throughout the week.
- 3. Exhibitors may enter a maximum of **thirteen** (13) classes including one (1) Halter class, one (1) Team Versatility class and eleven (11) choice classes. Exhibitors <u>must</u> enter a Showmanship class and may enter ONLY one Showmanship class. **Exhibitors may ONLY enter ONE Equitation/Horsemanship class. PREMIUMS WILL BE PAID ON ALL SHOWMANSHIP, WESTERN/ENGLISH RIDING PATTERN, EQUITATION OR HORSEMANSHIP AND TRAIL CLASSES.**
- 4. There will be SIX(6) places in each class, except where otherwise noted.
- 5. Protective headgear: NOTE- NEW RULES BEGINNING 2017:
  - All exhibitors in the Youth Division in all hunter (over fences, on the flat and bareback), dressage, bareback, saddle seat and gymkhana classes as well as ANY exhibitor (any seat) age 8 years and under, are required to wear properly secured protective riding helmets whenever they are mounted. The helmets must meet the specifications of the American Society for Testing and Materials (ASTM), must be manufactured and distributed by a participant in the certification program of the Safety Equipment Institute (SEI) and must bear the SEI certification level (SEI F1163 or above). The exhibitor (or his or her parent or legal guardian if the exhibitor is a minor) not the local show officials or judge- is solely responsible for complying with the

headgear rule. Show officials reserve the right to spot-check helmets at any time to verify compliance with this rule. It is highly recommended that all exhibitors participating in horse shows, practice events and any other riding activity wear protective headgear. There will be no discrimination against protective headgear, even if the style does not match the style of riding. Harnesses must be secured and must properly fit the head. A well-fitting helmet should stay on the rider's head when the rider bends over at the waist and shakes his or her head from side to side.

- 6. Any questions or disputes must immediately be presented to the Fair Board Equine Committee for evaluation and resolution.
- 7. JUDGE'S DECISION IS FINAL!!

#### 8. NOVICE DIVISION:

- A. Novice Division, 9 & Over, Any Seat, Horse & Pony.
- B. Exhibitor may NOT compete in the Wayne Co. Fair Novice Division if a) They have competed for 2 years or more in ANY county fair equine competition; b) They have competed in Wayne Co. Fair Novice Division for two (2) years.
- C. Novice riders shall not enter any other division; including but not limited to: Age Group, Saddle Seat or Pony. Novice riders also shall not compete as a Protégé in the same competition year as when competing as a Novice rider.
- D. Division 16, Youth Horse and Pony Rule #11 regarding one horse, two riders also applies to Novice riders.

Please refer to 4-H Horse & Pony Show Rules & Regulations for additional competition and safety rules.

## **Definition of Stock & Pleasure Type Horses:**

- 1. Stock Type Horse: Stock type horses are any horses with quarter type conformation, included but not limited to Quarter Horses, Appaloosas, Palominos, Pinto, Paints, Buckskins, and Thoroughbred crosses.
- 2. Pleasure/Saddle Type Horse: Pleasure/Saddle type horses are any horse with saddle type conformation, including Arabians, Half-Arabians, Morgans, Saddlebreds, Pintos, Palominos, Buckskin, Tennessee Walkers, Racking Horses and Anglo-Arabians.

- 1. Open to registered 4-H youth who have turned in all their fees and all their paperwork by July 15, 2017.
- 2. Any youth unable to attend the Master Stockman test on July 29, 2017, or August 11, 2017, must notify the Education Committee Chairperson of any extenuating circumstances prior to the test date.
- 3. Live animal Showmanship will consist of animals from the following Livestock and Small Animal Divisions: Beef Cattle, Dairy Cattle, Goats, Swine, Sheep, Rabbits, and Poultry. All participants are required to show live animals from these divisions.
- 4. To qualify for Master Stockman competition, the participant must place 1<sup>st</sup> or 2<sup>nd</sup> in showmanship class in the following divisions: Beef Cattle, Dairy Cattle, Goats, Swine, Sheep, Rabbits, Cavy, and Poultry.
- 5. If a 4-H member places 1<sup>st</sup> or 2<sup>nd</sup> in Showmanship in two or more divisions, then the member will choose only one division under which to enter. The 3<sup>rd</sup> place exhibitor in that class will then be allowed to compete in that division
- 6. Round Robin Showmanship Contest will be scored (per specie) on:
  - A. Showmanship 20
  - B. Knowledge 10
  - C. Personal Appearance of Exhibitor 5
- 7. Questions will encompass all aspects of breeding, showing, market, veterinary science, and animal husbandry. Questions for this contest are formulated from information obtained from *Michigan State University Extension Publications*. *Livestock Resource Manual* may be obtained from the 4-H Livestock Developmental Committee.
- 8. All participants must be in show attire. See dress code and superintendent requirements.

# **SECTION - 2: Educational Market & Breed - Record Books**

## **Rules:**

- 1. In order to participate in the market livestock competition and auction, 4-H youth and non 4-H youth are required to submit one completed record book regardless of the number of species being shown.
- 2. The purpose of the Educational Record Book is to keep record of purchases and expenditures associated with the market project. Proper management skills and record keeping for the market animal is the goal.
- 3. All market projects entered in the class must have met the possession date, the tattoo date, or the banding date.
- 4. Educational Market Books are available from MSU Extension online, 4-H personnel in the Master Stockman testing area, or the fair office.
- 5. All Educational Record books must be completed and turned in to MSU Extension 4-H personnel or whomever is administering the Master Stockman Test on the same day as the official Master Stockman test, **July 29, 2017, between 12-2:00 pm.**
- 6. Exhibitors nor parents are not allowed to be present during the evaluation of the record books.
- 7. Based on class size, Educational Record Book classes may be combined and judged on percentages.
  - Junior 7-10 years old as of Jan. 1, 2017
  - Intermediate 11-13 years old as of Jan. 1, 2017
  - Senior 14 years and up as of Jan. 1, 2017
- 8. Turning in an incomplete educational record book will result in a 3% reduction from total auction earnings. Inappropriate or vulgar responses may result in an additional 3% reduction.
- 9. Record books turned in late will receive an additional ½% reduction per day late. No record books will be accepted after July 31, 2017. You will not be allowed to participate in the 4-H livestock auction, regardless of placement.
- 10. The majority of the Educational Record Book can and should be completed before fair. Research questions and work on the book throughout the year.
- 11. An easy way to keep up with feed purchases, other expenses and daily events is to use a folder. Hang a calendar large enough to write on in a convenient place. Take the time to write down when you increase feed, work your animal, administer medication, etc. Then, when you sit down to organize your record book, all of the information you need, will be located together. Place all receipts and important information in the folder.
- 12. **Complete all sections**, double check your math calculations. Be sure to add dollar signs and unit labels (lbs., oz., etc.) as needed.
- 13. Have someone review your spelling and grammar. Always use proper spelling and write neatly.
- 14. The final Educational Record Book is to be written in black or blue pen by the exhibitor.
- 15. If rules are not followed, your Educational Record Book may lose points or be disqualified from grading and/or being displayed at auction.
- 16. Educational Record Books will be displayed during the livestock auction.
- 17. Previous years' Educational Record Books can be displayed in the Youth Building under Educational Projects.

- The Wayne County 4-H Livestock Auction will be held on Thursday evening during the Fair at 6:30 p.m. in the Livestock Pavilion.
- The auction is open to registered 4-H youth (age 9-19) or non 4-H youth (age 7-19) who exhibit a market animal which receives passing award on meat quality for his or her market animal, and who have turned in their fees and paperwork on time. All eligible Grand and Reserve Champion market animals MUST be sold through this auction. All age requirements noted in this Division are as of January 1<sup>st</sup> of the current fair year.
- All market 4-H youth and non 4-H youth livestock sales will be required to pay a commission of 22% of total sale price. The commission is used to pay for the auction for the following year. This commission can be reduced to as low as 45% by participating in different activities as established by the Wayne County 4-H Livestock Developmental Committee. A list of activities is as follows:

Work bee time must be submitted to the auction chairperson on a completed Work Bee Participation Form in order to receive credit. -3% ALL non 4-H youth will pay a \$10.00 Livestock fee and 22% deduction on auction sales
- Animals going through the 4-H Livestock Auction must be ear tagged or tattooed by the 4-H Livestock Developmental Auction Committee.
  - A. Steer- First Saturday in May
  - B. Swine-First Saturday in May
  - C. Lambs-First Saturday in May
  - D. Goats- First Saturday in May
  - E. Poultry- Last Saturday of July
  - F. Rabbits- Last Saturday of July

These dates also coincide with the Wayne County Fair Association, Inc. animal tagging dates. No animal going through the 4-H auction may have been previously shown or exhibited at any other county show or 4-H fair.

- All eligible market animals MUST be sold at the 4-H auction unless the 4-H youth or non 4-H youth completes an Auction Withdrawal Form and submits it to the Auction Chairperson by 7:00 p.m. on Wednesday of fair week.
- All exhibitors selling livestock through the 4H auction must be in show clothes, 4H, or 4H club attire in order to sell their livestock. No bare feet, sandals, torn/thread-bare clothes, or open-toed shoes are allowed for safety reasons. Hard-soled shoes are also recommended.
- All youth must present their own animal for sale in the auction ring. If an emergency arises and a youth cannot be present, they must contact the chairperson.

- 8. Youth selling animals are responsible for their animals until the animals are claimed by the buyer or released for processing. All animals must be picked up by 1:00 p.m. on Sunday following the Auction. Any animal not picked up by 1:00 p.m. will be sent home with the youth.
- 9. No medication can be given to any market animal 30 days prior to fair.
- 10. Any youth participating in the 4H Livestock Auction **MUST** write all of their buyers a thank you cards. Each youth is responsible for turning in their buyers' thank you cards to the Auction Chairperson by Noon on Saturday of fair week. Failure to do so can result in the loss of that buyer attending the 4H Livestock Auction in the subsequent year(s).
- 11. Meat turkeys will be sold through the auction individually, and **must** weigh a minimum of 16 lbs.
- 12. No more than two pens of each species of poultry can be put through auction per youth.
- 13. A mandatory auction meeting will be held in April and again during the week of fair. All 4H youth and non 4-H youth selling animals in the auction must attend both meetings. First year members that join after April are exempt from the April meeting.

\*Completed Sponsorship form(s), fee(s) and buyer names and addresses must be turned into the Auction Chairperson by June 1<sup>st</sup>. The amount of buyer names and sponsors above is a minimum. Additional names and sponsors are always appreciated.

\*\*If special circumstances interfere with attending a mandatory work bee between August 1<sup>st</sup> and the day prior to fair move in day, you must contact the 4-H Livestock Chairperson no later than the first of July to discuss other arrangements. Any exceptions must be submitted in writing to the 4-H Auction Chairperson no later than 3:00 pm on fair move in day.

# ADULT CANNING AND PRESERVING

## 2016 JUDGING GUIDELINES

## APPOINTING JUDGES

- 1. Judges to be appointed by the Superintendent.
- 2. One of the judges will be a trained person, Extension Agent or Master Food preserver from the County Extension Office.
- 3. Judges will not be allowed as a contestant for what they are judging.
- 4. We recognize the following guidelines as authorities in safe food preservation. Judges may use them to validate quality criteria of entries. Although information in these references may differ slightly, each book is correct and safe.
  - Ball Blue Book of Preserving, copyright 2006
  - Ball Complete Book of Home Preserving, copyright 2006
  - USDA Complete Guide to Home Canning, 5th Edition

# **ENTRANT ELIGIBILITY**

- 1. All eligible entries must be preserved in the same brand of jar and lid: Ball® Jar sealed with a Ball® Lid and Band, or Ball® Collection Elite® Lid and Band, or canned in a Kerr® Jar sealed with a Kerr® Lid and Band.
- 2. Entries in the Soft Spread category must be prepared using Ball® Pectin: Original, No Sugar Needed, or Liquid. The UPC from the Ball® Pectin package must accompany the entry as proof of purchase.
- 3. Entries must be labeled with product name, date of preparation, processing method and processing time.
- 4. All preserved foods must have been prepared within a one-year (1) period prior to the judging date.

## JUDGES DO NOT TASTE PRESERVED FOODS AS PART OF JUDGING.

# **QUALITY CRITERIA**

# 1. FILLED JAR

- Headspace must correspond to instructions on the jar and lid packaging or the reference guides listed. The top
  of the finished recipe or liquid covering produce should provide adequate headspace as stated in approved
  guidelines.
- Air bubbles must be kept to a minimum. Gas bubbles denote spoilage and identified by movement of bubbles to the surface of the product while the jar is stationary.
- Bands should remain in place to transport preserved food. Remove bands carefully to determine if the headspace is correct. Replace bands for display.

## 2. HEAT PROCESS

- Methods used to heat process foods must comply with current preserving guidelines as stated in the approved
  reference guides. The boiling-water process for acid foods and steam-pressure process for low-acid foods are
  the only recommended methods to heat process foods for preserving.
- Times for heat processing preserved foods correctly vary depending on each specific recipe or food type. Processing times must be in agreement with those listed in the approved reference guides.

## 3. PRODUCT APPEARANCE

- Product should be free from blemishes, stems, pits and peels. Some recipes may state stems, pits and peels are not removed, and this is acceptable if the recipe is in keeping with all other preserving guidelines.
- Liquid must be clear and free from cloudiness and small particles, unless the ingredients added to the recipe would naturally affect the clarity.
- Color of the finished product should be as close to its natural characteristics as possible or standard for cooked product.
- Texture is affected by heat processing yet the finished product should not appear over-cooked or break down.
- Ingredients should retain their shape and size based on the type and preparation method. Cut pieces, of uniform size, should be packed evenly in the jar yet allowing adequate room for liquid to circulate throughout the jar.
- Safety is of utmost importance. Any entry exhibiting spoilage or not in compliance with judging guidelines *must be disqualified*.
